REP. TRONE INTRODUCES BIPARTISAN LEGISLATION TO HELP PREVENT OPIOID ADDICTION

Rep. Trone Introduces Bipartisan Legislation to Help Prevent Opioid Addiction

WASHINGTON -- Today, U.S. Representative David Trone (D-MD), along with Reps. Guy Reschenthaler (R-PA), Teresa Leger Fernandez (D-NM), and David McKinley (R-WV), introduced the bipartisan *Opioid Patients' Right to Know Act* to help prevent opioid addiction across the country.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), health care providers dispensed over 153 million opioid prescriptions in 2019, and a recent study estimates that 1% to 4% of individuals who take prescription opioids develop opioid use disorder, putting their lives at risk. The *Opioid Patients' Right to Know Act* would create a grant program to incentivize states to require prescribers to discuss the addictive qualities of the drugs with patients and inform them of alternative treatment options before
