According to Angelo Valente, Executive Director of the <u>Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey</u> (PDFNJ), research shows that kids as young as 5th and 6th grade are being offered drugs and tobacco.

"Hearing that 10- and 11-year-olds were being approached, we realized that prevention needed to start early," he said. "And looking for an ageappropriate program led us to the development of the Third Grade Life Choices Coloring and Activity Book."


As part of one of several PDFNJ programs designed to supplement drug-prevention and health curricula in New Jersey schools, these books are a fun and engaging way for young children to not only learn about making healthy choices but also pledge to avoid drugs, alcohol, and tobacco.

In addition to pages for coloring, a crossword puzzle, and other games related to diet, exercise, and drug avoidance, the books include a contract to be signed by the students in which they promise to make healthy life choices.





Knock Out Opioid Abuse Day aims to improve understanding of the opioid crisis through a mobilization effort with a dual focus: educating prescribers and raising awareness among New Jersey citizens and families. Through collaboration with the Community Coalition for a Safe and Healthy Morris, the New Jersey Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (GCADA) and the New Jersey Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services (DMHAS), the Partnership for a Drug-Free New Jersey coordinates 10,000 participants across the state to share opioid prevention, education and awareness messages and materials.

The program's reach is augmented by securing legislative support from the New Jersey General Assembly and Senate through the passage of a resolution designating October 6 as Knock Out Opioid Abuse Day in New Jersey.

In the U.S. Surgeon General's Spotlight on Opioids, he wrote that "the best way to address the opioid crisis is to work towards achieving better health through better partnerships, Health advocates must involve businesses and law enforcement organizations they have witnessed the negative effects of opioids and have a strong interest in helping end the epidemic.

Knock Out Opioid Abuse Day helps to get these and other community stakeholders involved in addressing the crisis. Messaging and materials are available for use by all attendees who wish to replicate the initiative in their community.

Messaging

Knock Out Opioid Abuse Day leverages community and cross-system collaboration to outreach to New Jersey's 21 counties with information on the potential for dependency of the opioids prescribed and the link to heroin and fentanyl deaths in the state. The initiative also focuses on encouraging conversations between prescribers and patients regarding the potency of prescribed opioids.

It is vital to incorporate a range of message options, from digital toolkits to paper materials, that engage all potential advocates. Participants are eager to get involved but odds of successful outreach are higher when they are offered advocacy options with which they are comfortable.

Attendance

The 2022 Learning Series achieved significant growth, drawing participants from many important positions and organizations key to fighting the opioid crisis, from New Jersey and beyond. Attendees included:

- Representatives from 82 of New Jersey's 112 hospitals
- Employees from nearly 90 school districts in New Jersey

- Veterans Affairs; Food and Drug Administration; Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; United States Court; Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives; High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area)

Educational Impact

The 2022 Knock Out Opioid Abuse Day Learning Series provided several opportunities for professionals to earn state-mandated education credits on the topic of opioids. Credits were earned by more than:

- 650 social workers
 150 public health professionals
- 350 pharmacists
 225 doctors, dentists and nurses

Social Media

Social media has helped to extend the reach of the program, especially during the COVID-19 pandemic. Participants have amplified their in-person outreach efforts or got involved in the program for the first time by sharing via social email and other virtual methods.
